

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

## TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 2020

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Good morning,

everyone. This meeting's called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up

for public comment?

MR. TROBMAN: Morning, Commissioners. No, we have no public commenters this morning. Ms. Miller.

MS. MILLER: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This brings us to the end of Agenda Items three through seven. Let's pause for a few moments to reset the rest of the meeting.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Everybody ready to tackle the rest of this?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Perfect. All right. We'll pick back up with Agenda Item eight but staff doesn't have anything to present for Agenda Item eight. So we'll move to Agenda Item nine, discussion, consideration and possible action regarding (unintelligible) public comment (unintelligible) Chapter 806, purchasing from people with disabilities relating to the implementation of Senate Bill 753, 86 Texas Legislature regular session and PPD program improvements.

MR. HOOKS: Morning, Commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, this Michael Hooks with the Office of Disability Employment Strategies, VR Division. Today, I bring for your consideration potential action proposed rules for TWC, Chapter 806, purchasing for people with disabilities (unintelligible) to the chapter is to implement Senate Bill 753,

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86 Texas Legislature, including requirements for community rehabilitation
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    programs or CRPs to pay employees with disabilities minimum wage and submit
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    transition and retention plans to help with this requirement. And to provide
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    program clarification improvement opportunities, including maintaining 75
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    percent of direct labor hours to be contributed by employees with
    disabilities and allowing the Commission to approve a percentage difference.
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    Seventy-five percent at the time of the CRP's initial certification and
    subsequent recertification for CRP for reasons including the CRP's proposing
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    to participate in the PPD program to offer competitive, integrative
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    employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities. Staff seeks
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    direction on approval to solicit public comment on the proposed amendments to
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    40 TAC Chapter 806. I'm open to any questions you may have on that.
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                              CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?
                              COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman.
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                              COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None.
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                              CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have a motion on this issue?
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                              COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I move that we approve the
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    proposed Chapter 806 rules and the rule review to be posted to the Texas
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    Register as discussed by staff.
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                              COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second.
                              CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Here moved, second and we're
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    unanimous. Thank you. We'll move to Agenda Item ten, discussion,
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    consideration, possible action regarding the establishment of an information
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    technology (unintelligible) expansion program.
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                              MS. ARBOUR: Good morning, Commissioners, Mr. Serna.
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Courtney Arbour, Workforce Division. Last week staff brought forward for

your consideration, an IT-focused apprenticeship (unintelligible) paper with the use of WIOA dollars. UL had some questions for staff, which we've provided written responses to in the last week. Each of your offices individually received those same responses and I'm here as a resource to clarify any of those questions and answers or provide any other information.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, before I make any comments, I'd like to hear from both yourself and Commissioner Demerson, if that's okay, since this item was brought up at my request.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Commissioner Demerson.

(unintelligible) staff provided answers to a lot of the question that were raised and so, Courtney, thank you guys for getting that (unintelligible) I did not have any additional questions. The only thing that I talked about was the fact the \$4 million, this was the entire \$4 million and I would like to see that reduced from \$4 million to about \$2 million, so at least half of it because we really didn't have funds available from what I've heard. But anyway, the \$2 million allows us to maybe do some other things in response to this pandemic and other things that may be of interest. And so those were the only comments I had. I really did not second the motion because Chairman had questions and I wanted to make sure those questions were (unintelligible) before we took any actions on this item. That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I have one remaining question. It has to do with the purchase of tools. So the answer to that question was still a little bit vague. You used the word hardware in your answer. Does

that include computers, computing peripheral equipment. Uh, what would encompass tools in this instance?

MS. ARBOUR: Normally, when we develop an RFA similar to this one, we would go back with the office who made the request to clarify but there was an expectation here that we would make some hardware and software available to grantees if they had a stated need.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: But we don't know what that is?

MS. ARBOUR: I have not heard from an employer specific to the hardware needs. We know that some of the software-based trainings--or we can assume that with some of the software based trainings, the software will be a key part of the training.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay. Then that's all the questions I have.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Courtney, I have a question for you. Can you tell me how much, for clarification, I know you sent a email out earlier, it wasn't last night, this morning, on how much we have and we owe reserve as of today?

MS. ARBOUR: Yes, sir. I sent an email late yesterday afternoon that we were doing a couple of things as requested last week. We've gone back to the workforce boards who have WIOA funding and their cost per might have been lower and in different programs and if they anticipated or the local needs changed and we've identified about \$250,000. That wasn't in the email, Commissioners, I've just learned that this morning. But the boards have identified about \$250,000 in dollars that may go unspent that we could sweep back. But in addition, we worked with finance and looked back at the funding that was set aside for one of the other Covid-related

projects, the skills enhancement project. You all approved funding in a larger amount than what staff were able to negotiate. And so an additional \$4 in WIOA is available to you at this time. So that brings the total to about--about 8.3 in addition to the 250 that wasn't in the email that I mentioned or that I sent you last night.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Thank you, Courtney.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Additional comments or

questions? Do we have a motion on this issue?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I have a motion. I move that we approve the statewide initiative as discussed by staff at \$4 million for an IT apprenticeship program.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a second?

made comments earlier about the fact of the dollar amount and four million that we have here, Courtney mentioned something about 4 million coming back but again, that was set aside for a skills development fund, related projects as the staff's gone back and said that they—they can't commit those just yet, I believe. But that was a very useful program and it's one that, uh, we put out there that there may be some use there. And so I'm very hesitant to really tap in to those dollars because they were (unintelligible) and we probably have these pandemic—related issues or situations that are there. I think last week when we were talking, Commissioner Alvarez, the \$4 million that would be remaining would pretty much be wiped out, leave us with \$200,000. I think it was \$4.2 million or so. And the new information comes back, I'm not sure, you know, in regards to that. I'd like us to go at half of that, which allows us to do some other things perhaps, along these lines.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay.

	CHAIRMAN DANIEL. Okdy.
2	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Would you be in agreement to
3	go from \$4 million to \$3 million? I mean, I know you're gonna be meeting
4	with some folks regarding how we can train IT folks.
5	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yeah, so \$4 million to \$3 million,
6	Courtney, the remaining money that's coming back, is that the skills
7	development fund that we utilized forwhat was that \$4 million for that you-
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9	MS. ARBOUR: That \$4 million that has been
10	identified as available to you was from the online learning. We went
11	(unintelligible) metrics online learning and when you approved that funding,
12	WIOA, not skills development funding, it was WIOA and we called it the Skills
13	Enhancement project. You approved it at \$5.8 million and we were able to get
14	unlimited license and a really good negotiated package at just under 1.8
15	million. So if you've got \$4 million in addition to the 4.3 that we've
16	discussed previously.
17	COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Okay. That \$4 million, is
18	that for use of statewide initiatives if we come up with other initiatives
19	(unintelligible) okay, \$4 million there. Mr. Alvarez, yeah, down to \$3
20	million would be fine.
21	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Okay. I would be okay with
22	\$3 million.
23	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay. So procedurally, it sounds
24	like we have a motion for \$3 million to implement the staff proposal from

last week. I think that's what I just heard. Commissioner Demerson seems

inclined to second that but if we could do that for the record, that would be 1 2 important. COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah, second that motion. 3 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So we have a motion before us to 5 implement the staff recommendation from last week at a total of \$3 million rather than \$4 as staff proposed originally. Commissioner Alvarez, I'm 6 7 assume you're voting aye? 8 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Aye, sir. 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yeah, Commissioner Demerson? COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah, I'm in favor of that. 10 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I, too, would be in favor of that. 12 And so let's move forward on that. 13 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Great. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Let's move to Agenda Item 11, statewide initiatives but staff doesn't have anything to present there, so 15 16 we'll move to Agenda Item 12. This is discussion, consideration and possible 17 action regarding guidance on resource utilization and implementation of 18 services and strategies to target disaster relief efforts and public health 19 emergencies and putting those funds with the Department of Labor's disaster 20 dislocated worker grant. 21 MR. SERNA: Courtney? I think we have an update 22 from Courtney Arbour on our activity in that area. 23 MS. ARBOUR: That's correct (unintelligible) 24 Workforce Division. I have some notes here that I'm going to read from. 25 There's a lot of numbers here, so I want to make sure I get them right for you. I do have an update on the Covid response items that the Commission

approved a few months ago. As you know, we rolled out a number of different funds or grants very quickly after your approval and I want to give you just some of the key stats on what type of services have been provided and what those numbers look like for both employers and claimants and job seekers. With the Disaster Dislocated Worker grant that we received from the Department of Labor, we've enrolled 557 participants and about half of those are now employed. We have hired a number of temporary staff with the TANF dollars to help with local needs to help job seekers with all they need during this period of transition while they're trying to get back to work. And also reaching out to employers to help with their hiring needs and other struggles that they have faced during Covid. With the WIOA grants, we've served 81,318 individuals and with the Skills Covid dollars, the Skills Development fund dollars, \$278 employers are participating with \$3,189 people trained.

You know that we contracted with a couple of call centers, different than what the UI call centers do. The call centers that we contracted were to help make phone calls to claimants because there was just such a demand for staff support. We contracted with two call centers and they've been contacting claimants to see how we can help, helping them get registered for work, pointing them toward Workforce Solutions Offices.

And to date, since we contracted with them in July, they contacted more than 341,000 claimants, helping more than 35,000 complete a Working Texas registration and while they—the goal is really to help people find resources. We've learned through those calls that 16,798 claimants were contacted have returned to work. During our calls to them, they've let us know they've gone back to work. We've also done a round of surveys to people

that have received calls from the call center staff to see if they found 1 2 these phone calls and the support helpful. We've had 1600 responses (unintelligible) 30 percent of the respondents have said that they've gone 3 4 back to work but we thought this was an interesting statistic, that of those 5 that have gone back to work, 67 percent of those indicated they've gone back to work with the prior employer. So we appreciated hearing that, that 6 7 employers are able to bring back many of their past workers. Forty-six percent indicated using work in Texas to look for a job and they've used it 8 9 to identify jobs in their local areas. Metrics, online learning, I mentioned it a moment 10 11 ago, we contracted in July with metrics to provide a number of online courses 12 to claimants at no cost to them. We've had 43,770 claimants register to use 13 the system, 31,243 courses have been completed with about 37,000 hours spent. 14 So we are glad to see so many claimants using this no-cost resource right now to increase their skills while they have time to do so. I'm happy to answer 15 any questions about the update. 16 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions? 18 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Courtney, good update. If 20 you have that on paper, I'd love to get a copy of that report. That's good 21 information, love to kind of share that out. Especially what the employers 22 are doing from that standpoint. MS. ARBOUR: Great. I'll send it to each of you 23

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Thank you.

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now.

1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Courtney, great. Any additional questions, comments? None? All right. That's it on Agenda Item 12. I know 2 3 on Agenda Item 13, staff has nothing to report. Let's move to Agenda Items 4 14 and 15 reports. I believe we do have a legislative report today. 5 MR. MCCARTY: Good morning, Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson and Mr. Serna. For the record, 6 7 Tom McCarty, external relations. Yesterday was the first day of pre-filing of legislation for the 87th Texas Legislature. Prefilling will continue until 8 the legislature convenes on Tuesday, January the  $12^{\text{th}}$  of 2021 at noon. 9 10 Yesterday, also the U.S. Senate returned from recess. The Senate has 11 indicated that it will be considering all appropriation titles that can be 12 combined into an omnibus funding bill that will fund the federal government 13 through the end of the fiscal year. The federal government funding currently 14 expires on December the  $11^{\rm th}$  of 2020. The U.S. House remains in recess until 15 next week and this concludes my remarks and I'm happy to answer any questions 16 you may have. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Right. Questions or comments? 18 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman. COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None. 19 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. Thank you. Mr. Serna, 21 executive director's report today? 22 MR. SERNA: Just one quick note to the 23 Commissioners. Tomorrow is Veterans Day and though the agency, like other 24 governmental organizations, will be closed. Our call centers will be open 25 and taking calls and working to serve our customers. I would like to let the

Commissioners know that we will, in-fact, be closed on Thanksgiving Day and

by that, I mean, our call centers. Our call centers will be closed on Thanksgiving Day, on Christmas Day and on the 1st of January to allow our staff and our contract staff to spend time with their families on those three days, those three holidays. Though those state agencies will be closed for longer periods of time, the call centers will only be closed on those single days, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day. So I wanted to let you all know about that. And that's all I have to report.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you for the update.

Questions or comments?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Chairman, before

(unintelligible) I'd like to ask him if you would have the staff and the team help my office with developing a proposal for future discussion with the Commissioners. It's around the restaurant and food service industry and, you know, you guys know, it's been devastated by Covid-19 and (unintelligible) prior to this pandemic, we had about 50,000 locations, 1.3 million employees in that industry, \$70 billion in annual revenue. So not only from that standpoint, Chairman, your past background, they represent 51 percent of the checks is food dollar supply, you know, state's food supply chain is very important, as well. And so I want to look at some sources of funding to potentially do some things to help them train their labor force while they're adapting to this new model. Governor and that strike force team did what they could and we continue to do what they can for that industry but I want to work with the team to see if there's anything else that we can do as folks start coming back in those areas. Many retrofit their businesses, carry out, delivery, capacity caps and all those kind of things. Social distancing that

1 we're having to do, as well. And so I want to look at some things there and, 2 Ed, if you allow me to work with the team, I'd very much appreciate that. 3 MR. SERNA: Absolutely, sir. We'll assist in any 4 way that we can in helping those industries. Yes, sir. 5 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Thank you. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Any other questions or 6 7 comments for Mr. Serna? COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman. 8 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. Is there any other 10 (unintelligible) come before the Commission today? 11 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: No, sir. 12 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I would just like 13 to say a few things. One, I'd like to acknowledge veteran's observance this 14 week. I want to thank all our boards for putting on a great red, white and 15 you event in our state. Very well received and I know we were all a part of 16 that, so I just wanted to acknowledge it at that time, all boards. I also 17 wanted to thank Tom McCarty and his team for allowing us to get a 18 proclamation from the Governor that I am presenting on behalf of the Governor 19 acknowledging National Apprenticeship week this week. As you know, we were 20 celebrating the festivities this week with various schools and apprenticeship 21 programs around the state and I wanted to present this to Ed so that he could 22 display it there outside of our commission room. So on behalf of the 23 Governor providing this with us, I wanted to thank Tom for getting it for us 24 so that we could go ahead and present it to the agency and to the

workforce that's made up of veterans and that is a nice initiative but it's

just a way the employer can make a difference hiring our nation's heroes.

And we appreciate all that they're doing in that regard.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Absolutely. Just through a interesting series of events, I had the opportunity last week to make the acquaintance of a veteran here in Texas who was wounded. Ultimately left the military, has become an entrepreneur and he's got a little business going on. We talked at great length about what it's like to come back, not just from the (unintelligible) areas but to come home wounded and then find a way to find the right kind of job upon leaving the military. And I gained a lot of insight from him. And tomorrow, you know, I think I'll spend a lot of time sort of thinking about, you know, what we can be doing to help ease that transition back into the workforce for the folks that are exiting the military and coming back into the civilian workforce in the state. And so I'm still thrilled to have an opportunity to talk to him and hear his story.

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It really helps me do a better job as a commissioner, as well. So tomorrow,
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    as we celebrate Veteran's Day. I'm sure we all have a similar story.
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    There's real folks that we're thinking about and real opportunities for a lot
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    of other veterans that I just haven't had the opportunity to meet yet.
